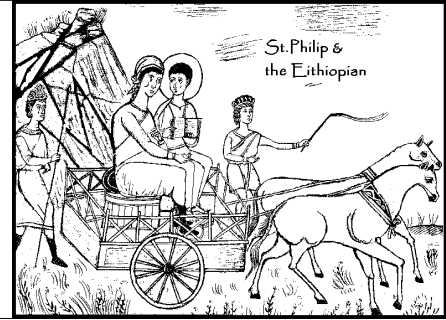

EDITORIAL FROM THE METROPOLIS DIRECTOR...

**When do we have Church School Classes?
How long are they to be?**

The answers for these two questions have not changed in over 20 years. They are also answers that are not acceptable to some parents, and therefore some parishes!

The answers were reiterated by Dr. Anton Vrame, the Archdiocese Religious Education Director, at the 2010 Clergy-Laity Plenary Session and in his published Report.

✦ **Children [are to] attend as much of the Sunday Divine Liturgy as possible, at**

least through Holy Communion.

✦ **Every Parish [is to] set aside between 45 minutes to one hour, per week for Sunday Church School.**



Thus, regardless of what time the children get to their classes, they are to have 45-60 minutes of class time with their teachers!

The Metropolitans and Bishops agree. One of their main tasks is teaching the Faithful. They want our young people to stay in the Orthodox Church because the young people want to do so. The youth are more apt to do

so if worship and education have been a priority in their family.

Parents are the first line of education when it comes to teaching the faith because the faith is lived out in the home.

Here is a scary thought. When Parents demote the value of worship and religious education, does this mean their children could do so as well?! Doing nothing is really doing something big in the negative direction!

What is our PRIORITY assuming we want our pews filled with our children?

What is not important, correct thinking or our choice?

Sunday morning sports –Do we really think our children will be professional sports stars? Even then, will Sunday sports help them in their spiritual development?

Sleeping in... unless as a parent you are not concerned about where you will be for eternity.

Permitting our children to decide for themselves... Ah, we promised Christ at their baptism to rear them in the Orthodox Church. As Orthodox parents, we do have an obligation to God, but it should really be seen as a joy. We are to do all we can to nurture our children in the Orthodox faith.

Our Lord is loving, patient and kind. What is our response?

cross-referenced by topic. In addition, the development in five categories was noted.

That work has been added to **Learning Objectives: "Living Our Orthodox Faith" Elementary School Textbook Series - What Your Child Should Know** to offer a type of check sheet of information in each textbook.

In addition, if a parish wants to show the parents the areas their children have studied and missed, **Progress Reports** were developed using the check sheet information. Then the responsibility falls on them to fill in the gaps.

Included in this Newsletter is the combined Learning Objectives of the DRE, the check sheet information, Progress Reports and an Attendance Sheet for this school year.

Consider sharing the portion developed by the DRE with the parents in the beginning of the year. This is a concrete means of showing parents what will be taught in their children's classroom. When they miss a class, the children miss a lesson that builds on the previous lesson; and each year builds on the previous year.

One value of the **Progress Reports** is to point out what lessons or topics were missed when their children were absent. It is up to the parent to make up the lesson.

Learning Objectives: Middle School / Junior High and High School Textbooks (in progress) - **What Your Child Should Know** was recently added. Stephania Gianulis and Aimee Cox Ehlers prepared this second major task, with additional material by Anton C. Vrame, PhD. This, too, is included in this Packet.

FOR PARENTS: At each seminar, I suggest distributing the words to the prayers, hymns, memory verses, etc. to the parents so they can be part of their children's education.

LEARNING OBJECTIVE FOR TEXTBOOKS GRADES 1-5 & Middle/Jr and Sr High



"What Your Child Should Know... after X Grade" was a project of our Department of Religious Education that has expanded and now refers to as **Learning Objectives: "Living Our Orthodox Faith" Elementary School Textbook Series - What Your Child Should Know**. Stephania Gianulis prepared this document, with additional material by Anton C. Vrame, PhD.

In 2000 Annunciation Church in Akron, OH worked on Learning Objectives and Tasks in an attempt to identify what students are to be taught, what topics may be missing and how to help teachers use the textbooks more effectively. To that end, the Prayers, Hymns, Songs, bible Stories, Memory Verses, Saints, Sacraments, Services and Vocabulary of each textbook were listed for each book and then

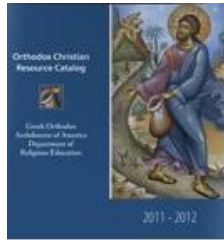

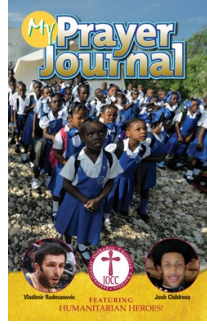
