Recommended Texts for Sunday Church Schools

The Department of Religious Education is continually developing new materials to replace older textbooks and fill gaps. Our current focus is on junior high and high school, and in the coming years we will turn to the elementary school materials. We realize that many parishes have been, of necessity, using a variety of texts from the DRE as well as those from other sources. The following recommendations will help parishes integrate new texts into their existing Church school curricula, use existing materials to their best advantage, and adapt or reorganize if needed.

Preschool

Use our textbooks and supplements in a two-year cycle:

God Loves Us teacher binder (N10)

Reaching for Jesus student book (N01) and teacher guide (N05)

What We See and Do in Church student book (K01) and teacher guide (K05) were originally written for kindergarten, but they may also be appropriate.

✂ Include story time from a children's Bible (catalog page 51: BIB501, BIB511, or BIB502) and appropriate storybooks, creative spiritual play, and Bible activity and coloring sheets (for end-of-class time). See catalog page 28 supplementary classroom resources, page 33 for reproducible coloring and activity books, and pages 39–50 for story books and individual coloring books.

Elementary School

The comprehensive textbook series for the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese's curriculum at the elementary level is *Living Our Orthodox Faith*. Each grade level has a student text and a teacher guide. Grades 1–5 each include a unit (that appears at the end of the book) of feast days for use throughout the liturgical year. Music and lyrics are included as noted, either in the teacher guide or in a separate songbook. A single CD (K26) contains all of the songs for all grade levels.

Kindergarten *Happy With God* student book (K16) and teacher guide (K20)

First Grade *Me and My World* student book (110), teacher guide (115), activity book (126), and songbook (120)

Second Grade *Loving God* student book (211), teacher guide (215), and songbook (220)

Third Grade *Sharing God's World* student book (320) and teacher guide (325)

Fourth Grade *Growing with God* student book (410) and teacher guide (415)

Fifth Grade *God Calls Us* student book (520) and teacher guide (525)

✂ Alternative: *Parables of Our Lord* student book (510) and teacher guide (515)

✂ Throughout the year, choose 5 or more topics from *Lives of the Saints and Major Feast Days* student book (501) and teacher guide (505); coordinate so that other topics from this resource can be covered in grades 6–8

✂ This book is from an older series of textbooks; develop interactive lessons to successfully engage today's youth.

✂ Please note that the DRE has not developed lesson plans for these books, which are published by other organizations.



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Middle School and High School (*as of January 2011*)

Each year, choose 4–5 units (about 25 lessons) from the following options, depending on the length of the unit and the time allotted for class. Many lessons may fill two class sessions. Longer books can be divided into two units to keep the approach fresh for both students and teachers. As we create new zines and teacher guides, the selection of units available will expand, providing more flexibility.

These four aspects simplify and replace the 15 strands described in the original *Living Our Orthodox Faith* scope & sequence chart. On average, each year includes the following units:

Bible:	1–2 units
Christian Life/Ethics:	1 unit
Feasts/Liturgy:	1–2 units
Faith/Church:	1–2 units

✍ Throughout the year, choose 5 or more topics from *Lives of the Saints and Major Feast Days* student book (501) and teacher guide (505); coordinate so that topics are not repeated in grades 5–8

✍ Textbooks from our older series (such as *The Sacraments*, *Teenage Ten Commandments*, and *The Creed*) include excellent texts and reading questions—but they do not have interactive components to which today's youth are accustomed. Teachers can make these units engaging, current, and educationally sound by planning lessons using the “shared Christian praxis” approach:

1. Focusing activity

The focusing activity draws the students' attention to the theme of the class session, using a story, allegory, or symbol. It is an introduction, and is not the heart of the lesson itself. Spend no more than 5–10 minutes on it.

2. Name present praxis

Help students to identify a part of the Orthodox Tradition or their current way of life, which was alluded to in the focusing activity.

3. Reflect on present praxis

Help students to inquire about and consider the implications of this part of their life and the Orthodox Tradition.

4. Access the Christian story and vision

Segue into the content of the lesson. If the students have not read the assignment, this would be the time. This can be done in a couple of ways. First, give the students 5–10 minutes to read silently on their own. Second, ask a few students to read a crucial paragraph or two aloud to the class.

5. Appropriate the story and vision

Help students to make the story *their own*. Allow students to retell the story in their own words, and to respond and to interact with it in an authentic way.

6. Decision for lived response

Students take what they have learned and consciously decide how this lesson can be put into practice and bear fruit in their lives from this point forward.

✂ Ensure that students learn and understand the Nicene Creed—perhaps as a class opener or closer, building it up phrase-by-phrase over a season or the entire year. Coniaris's *The Nicene Creed for Young People* (CB055) includes age-appropriate discussion questions.

✎ You may also choose to adapt readings and discussions from *The Creed* student book (1101) and teacher guide (1105). *Heaven on Earth* (M09) includes a feature on the sections of the Creed and its scriptural bases.
