GOALS & OBJECTIVES FOR EACH GRADE

The 40-page document that I wrote about in the Fall Newsletter was distributed at the Diocesan Clergy-Laity Assembly in October. Since then the Akron and Columbus Church School Staffs have been asked to (1) check off what is taught this year, and (2) what topics need to be added and when they should be added, reviewed, or expanded. I am working on a list of resources for the topics to be presented in Grades 7 & 8 and Grades 9-12. I will forward a copy of the document either by mail or email to anyone interested. Your input would be greatly appreciated.

Annunciation/Akron's Curriculum Committee is working on a "Critical Skills Checklist" and a "Parents' Packet" for each grade level. Developing materials that encourage and assist parental involvement in the task would be beneficial.

Although the **Archdiocese High School Curriculum Committee** has been formed and will be meeting in the near future, classroom teachers need suggestions now. I have included the Goals & Objectives for Grades 7-12 (8 pages) completed by Dr. Nicholas Gerassimakis and myself.

LESSONS ONLINE: If anyone has completed lessons on any of the listed topics and would be interested in offering the lesson plans, I have included a **lesson plan template** to standardize our efforts. These could be placed on my website for all to use and passed on to the Archdiocese Curriculum. Pages 10-12 of the 2000 **YELLOW PAGES FOR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION** [Fall Packet & online] lists materials that can be used in the lesson plans. Whatever work we do now will be valuable in the short term.

INTERIM CURRICULA FOR MIDDLE SCHOOL & HIGH SCHOOL

RESOURCES FOR TEENS

At the request of the "ZOE for Life!" organization, I have compiled *Resources for Sexual Abstinence: Marriage & Sexual Education* and included it in this packet.

Johanna Manley has donated a copy of her newest book *PEARLS FROM THE PROLOGUE* to the Diocese Display. Johanna has categorized the meditation portions from the 4-volume Prologue of Ochrid written by the late Bishop Nikolai Velimiorovich in one volume. I can see using this book to bring the Bishop Nikolai's understanding to the discussions in our Teen Classes and as an excellent source for spiritual mediation for the catechist.

THE CROSS AND THE QUILL - an online publication written by Orthodox teens for Orthodox teens - is designed for use with parish high school students, and is available for downloading the first week of each month from the web at <http://www.antiochian.org/>

Each issue will contain columns such as, "Ask Sayedna," where His Grace, Bishop BASIL will answer questions posed by teens, movie and music reviews and articles on a wide array of topics. The purpose of this publication is to stimulate thoughts on how to live an Orthodox life in today's society and to examine any moral questions of teenagers. Every issue of *The Cross and the Quill* is available online to download. Adobe Acrobat Reader (download it free from the Adobe Web Site) is needed to properly view each issue.

The first three issues are being written by the students of St. John Chrysostom Parish, York, Pennsylvania. Different parishes within the Antiochian Archdiocese will be taking turns writing and editing every three months. The Department of Youth Ministry edits all copy. Cost: \$25.00 plus SH. Hardbound. 160 pages. Over 50 illustrations. 21 Old & 26 New Testament stories.; ends with Pentecost. A copy was donated to the Diocese Display. This is a beautiful book and would make a great addition to the Parish library, or gift to our students in middle grades.

- *WHERE IS MY CROSS THAT I MAY FOLLOW HIM?* Our Lord said, "If anyone would come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross and follow Me." How can we do this? What does it mean to take up our cross? Where is the cross we must take up to be found? This booklet is the story (fictional) of three people, born on the same day in the same city, who spent their lives trying to find the answer. For older children.
- *THE TWO KINGS: A CAUTIONARY TALE* Story of two kings: a father and a son. One sees the great prosperity of his country and uses the riches thereof to ease the burdens on all, providing a life of comfort for all people in the kingdom. The other sees a country gone soft, its wealth fast disappearing, and institutes a program of strict discipline. What is the outcome for the two, for the country? Fictional (of course) account.
- *IS THERE TRULY A KING?* A man does not believe in "the king," but all creation seems against him as he searches far and wide for a quiet place where the shouts of everyone in praise of "the king" do not ring in his ears. Alas! There does not seem to be such a place. What can he do? What will happen? How will the matter be resolved?
- *CONVERSATIONS ON THE SACRAMENTS: WHAT DOES THE WORD 'SACRAMENT' MEAN?* Ten-year-old Elizabeth comes to her pastor's study to ask about the sacraments. "I don't even know what the word means," she says. And, she wonders about what happens in baptism -- and in the Eucharist. After their first talk, she watches a baptism carefully, pays attention in the eucharistic liturgy -- and comes back! *CONVERSATIONS ON THE SACRAMENTS: ARE THERE TRULY JUST SEVEN?* Once more 10-year-old Elizabeth comes to the pastor's study, this time with her 11-year-old friend David in tow for conversations with him have raised even more questions on the sacraments. Fearlessly they come, for they are children and know no such thing.

- **CONVERSATIONS ON THE SACRAMENTS: PRAYER TO FATHER, SON AND HOLY SPIRIT.** Ten year old Elizabeth and her 11 year old friend David have encountered a couple of other students at school (David says, "I think they're Muslims or something.") who say we worship three gods because we pray to Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Once again they go to Fr. Mark.
- **CONVERSATIONS ON THE SACRAMENTS: WHY CAN'T MY FRIEND RECEIVE COMMUNION?** Ten year old Elizabeth brought her friend Jeanine to the Sunday Liturgy. At the end her friend asked, "Why can't I receive communion? I'm a Christian!" Elizabeth could only think to say, "Well, you can't." But she wanted to better explain, so she went to see Fr. Mark.

HERE'S A GREAT IDEA!

Holy Trinity/Pittsburgh now has "The St. Spyridon Children's Library," overseen by Mary Magdalene Walsh. Book recommendations are included in the weekly and monthly bulletins. Head Mouse Keeper Mary Magdalene visits the classrooms each week with Spero the Church Mouse at her side to act out and tell stories. Students who checked out books or videos the Sunday before Thanksgiving received a Thanksgiving doorknob prayer. In honor of Spero's nameday, the student in each class who had checked out the most books and videos from the Library received a 12" plush toy. They all received Christmas cards from Spero, too. Reading books with a spiritual message is a wonderful way to reinforce our Orthodox Faith. Both St. Basil and St. John Chrysostom spoke/wrote about the importance of reading books that offer examples of virtuous people and reinforce our Christian teachings.
